

PAGE 5 GIRL'S PRISON NIGHTMARE — PART II

Handcuffed and hauled off to jail on bogus child abuse charge — her ordeal was just beginning...

An inexperienced public defender convinced Alison to plead guilty, assuring her that she'd be given probation and placed in a "diversionary program," and the charges would be expunged from her record forever.

"I didn't know I'd signed my life away," Alison says bitterly.

"It turned out I had to tell any employer of my charges of felony child abuse — for the rest of my life. I could never teach tennis to children again. And my favorite class had been peewee instruction, teaching little kids.

"They took away my career of 20 years like that."

Alison was ordered to attend and pay for numerous classes including parenting. She also had to maintain a full-time job — after getting axed by the snooty development soon after word of her arrest got out.

"I tried to apply for a telemarketing job. They did a criminal background check and didn't hire me," the former Page 5 girl remembers.

Anytime she violated a

minute condition of her probation, hard-nosed probation-officer snoops reported it and she was tossed in jail.

Her first jailing, for 12 days in January 2002, came when she had failed to keep a full-time job — after officials took away her ability to land work.

When the judge sentenced her to prison, "I passed out in the courtroom."

Her first stint was at a notorious tent jail in the desert, appropriately dubbed Australia, which was often blisteringly hot in the day and freezing cold at night.

"I got sick and almost died of dehydration," she says. "They treat you like crap and serve you slop for dinner — one girl found a mouse in hers."

Fellow prisoners here were a lot tougher than any drugged-out hookers.

"They were nasty men-

wannabe's," she says. "The fights I saw were horrific — the women's prison is worse than the men's."

Scared-stiff "new fish" Alison cried all the time — and lust-crazed prison lesbians were only too eager to offer the leggy blonde "comfort."

"They'd say 'You're so pretty' and put their arms all over you," she recalls.

Guards allowed lesbianism to flourish, disgusted Alison learned firsthand.

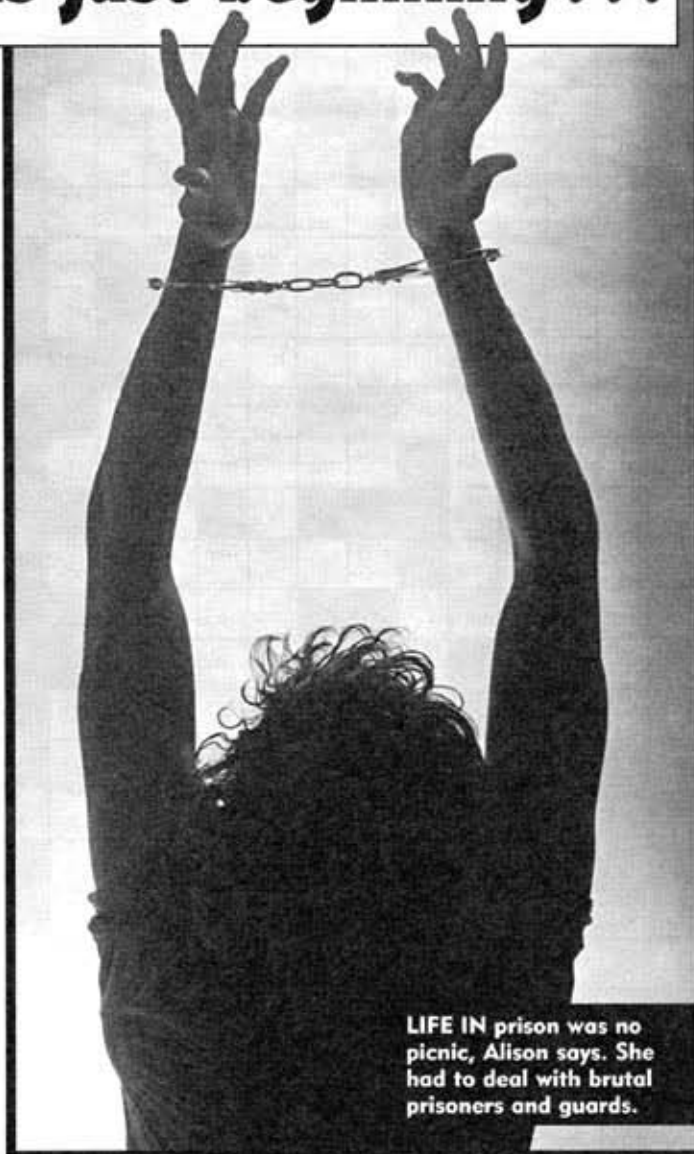
"I once saw five girls on top of each other," she reveals.

But that was a picnic compared to her third and most recent two-month stint for a supposed probation violation in October and November of 2002 — in a notorious warehouse for female cons known as the Tower.

"I was in with murderers, like the torso lady who cut up her husband — the worst acts imaginable," wholesome Alison says.

Her introduction to the grim hellhole was a de-

meaning strip search.

"They make you line up, squat and cough," explains the slender blonde. "One female correction officer, who looked like a man, would shout, 'That's not hard enough. Cough louder.'"

Life behind bars was like a Hollywood B-movie — but far more violent.

"I was in with a crazy girl who tried to beat me up," says the jailed mom.

And here, the super-aggressive lesbians just

wouldn't take no for an answer.

"These lesbians were hard-core — disgusting," bosomy Alison shudders.

Alison's probation period is winding down and thanks to a judge's order, she is no longer forced to tell employers about the guilty plea. However, anyone who does a criminal background check can instantly discover it.

Though she knows that speaking out may only land her in more hot water, the brave beauty refuses to keep quiet about the miscarriage of justice.

"I want readers to be aware of how the system can destroy someone's life," Alison warns.
